FFA SHOWMANSHIP

Superintendent: Blue Mountain FFA Advisors

RULES

- Members exhibiting livestock are required to make entry for showmanship awards in at least one division their livestock is entered. Members who exhibit livestock and poultry/rabbits must show in a showmanship class for both areas. A showmanship entry may be made for each kind of livestock entered.
- Animals to be shown in the showmanship class must have been shown in a conformation class at which time the superintendent or the judge may eliminate a showmanship entry from showmanship competition.
- Showmanship classes will be divided into Novice and Advance Showmanship. Novice Showmanship includes those exhibitors in Ag 1 & 2. When there are more than 15 entries in each class, the Superintendent will split the entries into two or more classes with not more than 15 entries in each class. The first and second place winners in each Showmanship Class will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion Showmanship for each species of livestock.
- The Champion Showman of each species of livestock (beef, sheep, swine, dairy, and goat) will then compete for the All Around Champion Showman Awards.
- Each contestant will be ranked on a 1-5-point basis by each judge for each species of animal. The individual with the fewest points will be the winner.
- FFA Showmanship Awards: the first place showman in beef, dairy, sheep, swine, and goat classes will be presented individual awards in the ring. Individual donors will provide these awards.
- Factors to consider when scoring showmanship: Appearance of showman (neat, clean, properly dressed) poise, promptness, calmness, alertness, and attitude of showman. Skill in showing the animal including: continuous attention while showing, controlling and keeping animal placed to advantage, ability to stand the animal, ability to move animal as requested by judge. The Animal: Condition (fleshing), clean, brushing and curling, clipping and brushing, feet and horns, condition of equipment.

FFA HERDSMANSHIP

Superintendent: Blue Mountain FFA Advisors

RULES

- The Herdsmanship award will be made on a chapter and an individual basis.
- Pens must be cleaned by 8:00 a.m.
- All FFA Chapters must make a Herdsmanship entry for each species of livestock entered.
- If animals or exhibitor's area is not properly cared for, including the period following the Awards Program, the Herdsmanship judge has the authority to have premium money withheld and to have exhibitor remove animals.
- To be considered for the Herdsmanship Award the exhibitor must have an exhibitor card neatly completed and displayed. Herdsmanship will be done by exhibitors only.
- Daily Herdsmanship banners will be awarded the top chapter exhibiting beef, sheep, dairy, swine or goats. At least two exhibitors with 3 beef or dairy animals or 5 head of sheep, swine or dairy goats must show animals for the chapter to be eligible.
- Factors to consider when scoring Herdsmanship: The exhibitor: Appearance - neat, clean and properly dressed; cooperativeness with fellow exhibitors and those in charge; Manner - degree and promptness in carrying out duties and responsibilities; general attitude and conduct.

Care of Animals:

- Kept clean at all times
- Adequate bedding used
- Fed and watered regularly
- Blankets used properly

Care of stalls, pens, aisles, tack area: exhibitor card displayed that is fully and neatly completed; equipment kept in show boxes; feed kept in feed aisle and not on top of pen; stalls to be labeled with chapter name; aisle kept clean and free for spectators. Tack area and equipment must be labeled with chapter name.

BREEDING

(American System 1-2-3, Danish System 1st blue, 2nd blue, 3rd blue). If steers and breeding animals are both exhibited, points may be combined to select a winner. For breeding animals, the animal must be registered with papers. This is open to exhibitors with one or more breeding and/or market animals. Winning the trophy in

previous years shall not exclude an exhibitor from winning it again. For market steers this award should go to the highest placing predominately black steer, being at least 50% Angus parentage, 50 points. It must be kept in mind that the purpose of this award is the promotion of the Angus Breed. Therefore Angus Breeding should take precedence over market animals.

Includes current year graduating seniors until State Fair state contests; and enrolled in at least one agricultural education course for an agricultural occupation, including a supervised occupational experience program, with the objective of establishment in an agricultural occupation.
3. High three chapter teams will receive banners, both contests.
4. A team may consist of five eligible members. The score of the three high individuals will be used to determine the team score. Greenhand and Advanced Team contests will be held.

LIVESTOCK JUDGING CONTEST

Teams will judge the following:

1. **Beef** - One class of market steer judging and one class of steer grading or feeder grading based on the State FFA contest that given year.
2. **Sheep** - One class of market lamb judging and one class of production ewe judging or a keep cull class with data to be alternated with swine.
3. **Swine** - One class of market hogs judging and one class of production gilts or keep cull gilts with data to be alternated with sheep.
4. One oral reasons class.

NOTE: Each class is worth 50 points. The total points possible will be 350.

1. A member may make only ONE entry in each lot. A member may enter up to four separate varieties in the "any other" variety categories in the Crop Division.
2. Exhibits must be in place in between Noon and 5 p.m. on Sunday, August 7th. In the Open Class Floriculture and Land Produce Building. (The Hermiston Senior Center.)
3. All entries must conform to the following or be disqualified:
 - a) All vegetables must be clean and of marketable equality (insects or disease will disqualify an entry).
 - b) Have been produced as a part of the members Supervised Occupational Experience Program and prepared for exhibit by the member unless otherwise stated.
 - c) Harvested since last year's State Fair.
 - d) Be in the quality and manner called for in the premium list.
 - e) Vegetables leave ½" on top.

4. All entries will be judged using the Danish system with scoring as follows:

- Blue - exceptional quality
- Red - meets bare min. trade standard
- White - may not meet trade standards but is marketable, free from disease, insects, damage, etc.
- NP - no placing

5. The FFA member must do all preparation of exhibits. Involvement of adults must be limited to advising. Any exhibit prepared by an adult will be declared ineligible for premiums.

6. Must be displayed on white paper plate.

FFA LANDSCAPE AREA CONTEST

Landscape Design Exhibit- A chapter may only have one entry.

The Exhibit:

- 1. Each Chapter will select its own theme. Themes must be posted by the exhibit and on design diagram.
- 2. Landscape designs may be set up on Sunday August 5th. Competition time must be by 8:00 p.m. Monday August 8th.
- 3. To consist of a plan drawn to scale on 18”x 24” CDC or blueprint paper. The plans to be given to the Superintendent in charge of the FFA Division at the completion of the exhibit, but before official judging time.
- 4. To be the work of one or more members of the Chapter. Adult involvement is to be limited to instruction and counsel, or premium money will be withheld.
- 5. The exhibit plan is to be drawn to scale 1”-1’. The scale used must be shown on the plan. The name of the Chapter is to be shown at the bottom right hand side of the sheet. The plants are to be keyed using any standard format.
- 6. Exhibitors will be responsible for providing all needed material for the exhibit, including a plastic sheet to cover the ground or grass on which the exhibit will be placed. The exhibit to occupy an outside space of 14’x14’. Space will be assigned as Chapters arrive to set up their entry.
- 7. Some plant materials may be donated by Westwinds Nursery on a first come, first serve basis. When supplies are gone, each Chapter is responsible for making their own arrangements.
- 8. Chapters will be responsible for leaving their exhibit space clean following the Fair.

Hints for Landscape Design

- 1. Bark dust should be pushed down.
- 2. Each display needs an attractive border or line on its edges.
- 3. All pots should be hidden and pots should not be mounded.
- 4. Plans need to be drawn to scale. Consult Sunset’s Landscaping illustrated or Landscaping by Jack E. Ingels.
- 5. Attention needs to be paid to details. For example, cover plastic tarps, pool edges, and remove bark dust from plant foliage.
- 6. Water, if used, should make noise.
- 7. Do not over plant. Plan for some plant expansion.
- 8. The plan should be adaptable to any backyard area. It should be developed for current and long-term aesthetics.

3. The test will be administered in Rankin Pavilion starting at 11:00 a.m. Tuesday morning. The tractor driving portion of the contest will start at 12:00 of the same day on the rodeo grounds behind the bucking chutes.
