Measure No: 111

Measure Designation: Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

Caption: Amends Constitution: State must ensure affordable healthcare access, balanced against requirement to fund schools, other essential services

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote requires state to ensure affordable healthcare access. State must balance healthcare funding against funding for schools, other essential services; courts must respect balance.

Result of No: "No" vote retains current law. The constitution does not require the state to ensure access to affordable health care; state provides some healthcare access.

Summary: Amends Constitution. Current state law outlines the general requirements for health insurance policies and provides health care for low income and disabled residents who meet eligibility requirements. Amends the Oregon Constitution to establish health care as a fundamental right; obligates the state to provide Oregon residents "access to cost-effective, clinically appropriate and affordable health care." Amendment requires the state to balance that obligation against the public interest in funding public schools and other essential public services. If the state is sued to enforce the amendment, the court may not order a remedy that interferes with the state's requirement to balance healthcare funding against funding for public schools and other essential public services.

Financial Impact: The financial impact to state and local expenditure and revenue is indeterminate. The measure does not require additional state government revenues or expenditures. The impact of the measure will depend on future legislative action to establish additional health benefits and determine how they will be paid for.

Measure No: 112

Measure Designation: Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

Caption: Amends Constitution: Removes language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote amends constitution to remove language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime; allows programs to be ordered as part of sentencing.

Result of No: "No" vote retains current language that generally prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude but allows slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime.

Summary: Amends Constitution. Article I, section 34 of the Oregon Constitution currently prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude but allows an exception to that prohibition as a punishment for crime. Measure removes language that allows slavery and involuntary servitude as a punishment for crime. Under measure, a court or probation or parole agency is allowed to order a person convicted of a crime to engage in education, counseling, treatment, community service, or other alternatives to incarceration, as part of sentencing for the crime. Ordered programs must be in line with programs that historically, or in the future, have been in place to provide for accountability, reformation, protection of society, or rehabilitation. Effect on current constitutional provisions requiring inmate work programs unclear.

Financial Impact: The financial impact to state and local expenditures and revenues is indeterminate. The measure removes language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as a punishment for a crime. The measure does not require additional state government revenues or expenditures however the impact of the measure will depend on potential legal action or changes to inmate work programs.

Measure No: 113

Measure Designation: Proposed by Initiative Petition

Caption: Amends Constitution: Legislators with ten unexcused absences from floor sessions disqualified from holding next term of office

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote disqualifies legislators with ten unexcused absences from legislative floor sessions from holding office as legislator for term following current term of office.

Result of No: "No" vote retains existing law. Absent legislators may be punished by legislative chamber (potentially expelled by supermajority); present legislators have legal authority to compel attendance.

Summary: Amends Oregon Constitution to add language prescribing consequences for unexcused absences by legislators from floor sessions. Currently, Senators and Representatives may be "punished" or, by the concurrence of two-thirds of the Senator's or Representative's chamber, "expelled" for "disorderly behavior," but law does not define "disorderly behavior." Additionally, absent legislators may be "compelled" to attend legislative floor sessions, but current law does not specify consequences for unexcused absences. Measure specifies that "disorderly behavior" includes legislator's failure to attend ten or more legislative floor sessions during a regular or special legislative session without permission or excuse. Under measure, legislator who engages in "disorderly behavior" through unexcused absences is disqualified from serving as a Senator or Representative for the term following the end of the legislator's current term.

Financial Impact: This measure will have no financial effect on either state or local government expenditures or revenues.

Measure No: 114

Measure Designation: Proposed by Initiative Petition

Caption: Requires permit to acquire firearms; police maintain permit/firearm database; criminally prohibits certain ammunition magazines

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote requires background check, safety training, fee for permit to acquire firearms; state police maintain new permit/ firearm database; criminally prohibits certain magazines; exceptions.

Result of No: "No" vote retains current law: seller/ transferor must request criminal background check; permit, safety course not required; no magazine capacity restrictions.

Summary: Oregon law currently allows persons over age 18 to acquire firearms (federal law requires age 21 for some handgun purchases), seller/ transferor must request criminal background check. Measure requires permit from local law enforcement to acquire firearm; person must pay fee, submit photo ID, fingerprints, complete approved safety training, pass criminal background check, not be prohibited from possessing firearms; officer may deny permit to person believed danger to self or others. Permit issued within 30 days, valid 5 years. Permit denials appealable. Must present permit, pass background check to acquire firearm. State Police creates/ maintains permit/ firearm database. Magazines over 10 rounds, or readily modifiable to exceed 10 rounds, prohibited; exception for current owners /inheritors. Exceptions for law enforcement, armed forces. Criminal penalties. Other provisions.

Financial Impact: The intent of the measure is for revenues from permits to cover administrative costs. Cost estimates related to the measure were received from state and local government. However, there is uncertainty in the assumptions regarding the estimates made, including the projections of the number of permit applications, the revenue associated with those permits and other related costs. There is also uncertainty in potential cost savings to state and local government expenditures due to an expected decrease in firearm related injuries and death. Therefore, the financial impact of Measure 114 for state and local governments is indeterminate.

Measure No: 30-162

Caption: Ban of Certain Psilocybin Businesses in Unincorporated Umatilla County

Question: Shall psilocybin manufacturers and service centers be banned from operating in unincorporated areas of Umatilla County?

Summary: Psilocybin is a psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. Oregon state law allows for the licensed manufacturing and supervised use of psilocybin in licensed service centers. Oregon state law also provides that a county governing body may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters, to prohibit the establishment of these businesses within the areas subject to the jurisdiction of the county. The Umatilla County Board of Commissioners has adopted an ordinance to refer to the voters that prohibits the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and service centers in the unincorporated areas of Umatilla County. Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin manufacturers and service center operators within the unincorporated areas of Umatilla County. A yes vote in favor of this measure will prohibit the certain psilocybin businesses and will not allow the licensed manufacturing and licensed service centers to operate in the unincorporated areas of Umatilla County. A no vote against this measure will allow the licensed manufacturing and licensed service centers to operate in the unincorporated areas of Umatilla County.

Summary: State law allows operation, manufacturing, distribution and possession of psilocybin and psilocin. State law provides that a City Council may adopt an Ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of any of those registered or licensed activities. Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin service centers and manufacture of psilocybin products within Athena's jurisdictional boundaries.

Question: SHALL THE CITY OF UMATILLA PROHIBIT PSILOCYBIN-RELATED BUSINESSES WITHIN THE CITY?

Summary: State law permits persons licensed, controlled, and regulated by the State to legally manufacture psilocybin products and provide psilocybin services to persons 21 years of age and older. Psilocybin is a hallucinogenic chemical that is obtained from certain types of fresh and dried mushrooms. The City of Umatilla is referring to the voters an ordinance that will prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the City of Umatilla.

Umatilla School District, 6R

Measure No: 30-158

Caption: Bonds to Provide Intermediate School Building and CTE Spaces

Question: Shall the District issue up to \$45,200,000 in bonds to build school buildings and CTE spaces; receive \$4,000,000 matching grant? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Summary: Umatilla School District proposes a bond measure not to exceed a principal amount of \$45.2 million and will receive state matching funds of \$4 million if bonds are approved.

If approved this measure would finance capital costs, including:

- Construction of new intermediate (grades 4-6) school building on South Hill to support increased students, including full-sized gym and increased playing field access.
- Updates to CTE building for Clara Brownell MS.
- Construction of new CTE building at Umatilla HS, including future expansion space for classrooms and additional gym.
- Renovation of McNary Heights ES to become a K 3 school.
- Site improvements, demolition, furnishings, equipment, bond issuance costs.

Bonds may be issued in multiple series; each maturing within 31 years from issuance. The estimated initial, annual tax rate is \$1.19 per \$1,000 of assessed value with an estimated total annual tax rate of \$2.12/\$1,000 of assessed value for all District general obligation bonds. Actual levy rate may differ due to final interest rates and changes in assessed value.

McKay Dam Fire District, 7-410

Measure No: 30-161

Caption: Five-Year Local Option Tax for Fire Protection Services

Question: Shall the District impose \$0.9385 per \$1,000 of assessed value for contract fire protection services for five years beginning 2023-24?

Summary: This measure would authorize the District to levy property tax at a rate of \$0.9385 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation each year commencing with the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023 for five consecutive years. The proposed rate would raise approximately \$57,000 in tax revenues in each of the five years of the levy. The District would use the tax revenue from this measure to satisfy obligation to the City of Pendleton for contracted fire protection services within District boundaries. Without funding from this measure it is likely that the District will be unable to pay for contracted fire protection services, during the period of the proposed local option tax, from the City of Pendleton which would have a negative impact on residents of the District. Without contracted fire protection services there is the potential for increased homeowners insurance rates for residents of the District.
